

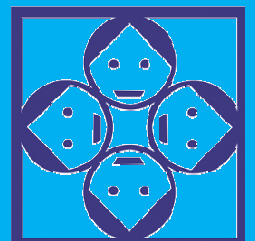

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AWAG'S VISION, MISSION, GOAL AND OBJECTIVES

- Raising awareness about their rights among community women and support them to lead a life free of violence.

'Women March For Change'

On 4 April 2019, AWAG along with a collective of organizations and activists joined in a national movement, 'Women March for Change' at Apna Bazaar, Ahmedabad in protest against the repeated attacks on the most basic Constitutional rights of citizens and demanding an end to atrocities against women.



Celebration of Children's Day



Children's Day was celebrated by AWAG in partnership with British Deputy High Commission (BDHC), Ahmedabad and Shreyas Balgram by organizing a programme by and for children. Over a hundred underprivileged children from Shreyas Balgram and Shri Jamnadas Bhagwandas Kanya Gruh had an enjoyable evening with a variety of

entertainment programs. Mr. Peter Cook and Ms. Amee Raninga from BDHC, Ahmedabad addressed the children and motivated them to work towards fulfilling their dreams and goals.

Celebration of International Human Rights Day

On the occasion of the 71st International Human Rights' Day on 10 December 2019, AWAG joined in with other organizations and activists in the Public Program organized by Movement for Secular Democracy (M.S.D.) at Sardarbaug, Ahmedabad. The program was based on the 2019 UNO Theme - "The Years of Indigenous Languages: Promoting and Deepening a Human Rights Culture."



A Tribute to Nirbhaya

On the occasion of 7th Anniversary of Nirbhaya incident at Delhi, AWAG joined in the Nirbhaya Sabha that was jointly organized at Ahmedabad on 16 December 2019 by All India Mahila



Sanskritik Sangathan (All India MSS), All India Democratic Student Organization (All India DSO), All India Democratic Youth Organization (All India DYU), Majoor Mahajan Sangh and Mansi Mahila Sewa Sakhi Mandal. The participants expressed their concern, anguish and pledged to fight the menace of rape and atrocities inflicted on women across the country.

Celebration of International Women's Day

In partnership with the British Deputy High Commission Ahmedabad, AWAG celebrated International Women's day on 7 March 2020 at Radhanpur, Gujarat. Over 400 people that included Community Leaders, Sarpanchs, ASHA Workers, Anganwadi Workers and School Teachers from AWAG's work area spread across the 58 villages in Radhanpur block of Patan district, Gujarat, were an integral part of the programme. As a precursor to the said event, preliminary mobilization, sensitization and orientation of the above-mentioned stakeholders on the issue of violence against women and celebration of Women's Day was undertaken in all the 58 villages covering 1140 stakeholders/members.



Following a demonstration that was staged at Sardarbaug-Ahmedabad on 8 March 2020, AWAG joined in a Women Convention that was organized in Ahmedabad jointly by All India M.S.S, Majoor Mahajan Sangh-Women's Wing and other women's organizations. The main slogan of the convention was - "Without Women's Emancipation, Emancipation of Civilization is not Possible."

Outreach Programmes on Violence against Women and Gender Awareness

In order to raise awareness about their rights among community women and support them to lead a life free of violence, under Project PANKHI, AWAG conducted periodic awareness sessions on Gender Based Violence with community women, Anganwadi workers, youth leaders, school children and adolescent girls.

MENTAL HEALTHCARE OF WOMEN

AWAG has been instrumental in implementing the Mental Health Project for Women since December 2008 covering the slum areas of Bapunagar, Rakhiyal, Gomtipur, Saraspur and Ramol in the industrial belt of east Ahmedabad.

The main objectives are:

- a) To provide counselling and psychiatric support to women suffering from mental illnesses,
- b) To strengthen women suffering from Domestic Violence to have better quality of life.

The following activities were undertaken to fulfil these objectives -

- Approaching communities to disseminate awareness about mental health through community leaders
- Guiding the patients to the path of curative treatment
- Counselling
- Psychiatric care with medicines
- Group therapy through workshops

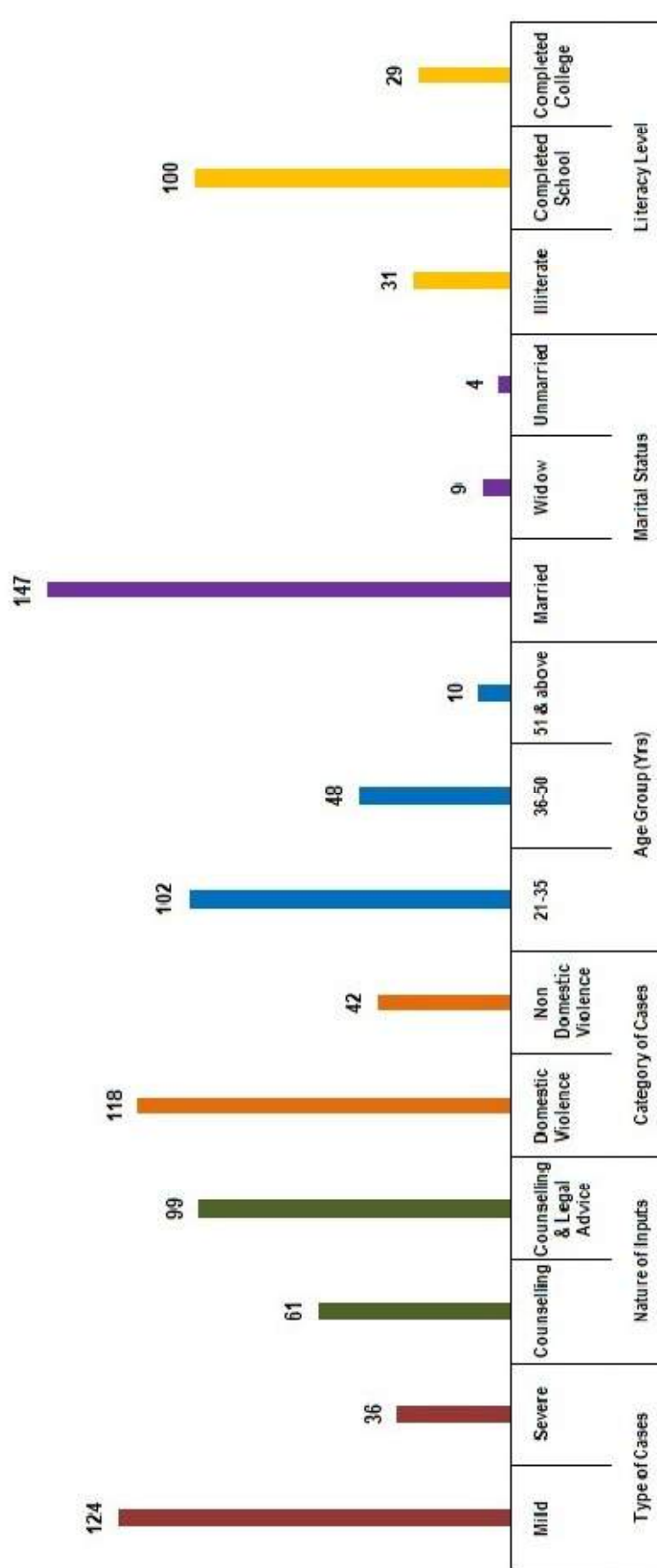
The awareness raising meetings were conducted in the defined areas through a total of 141 meetings covering 3683 women. The theme of the meetings was to provide a general understanding of mental disorders and the need to treat them for a healthy living. Over the year, 160 women approached AWAG's Centre to avail of the facility for treatment of mental illness through counselling and medical help. A majority of cases (75%) pertained to domestic violence wherein the victims were married, falling in the age group of 21-35 years and had completed schooling. These cases were largely rendered counselling. All the severe cases sought psychiatric help with regular follow-ups. This required provision of medicines which was supplied by AWAG with the support of Dr. Ajay Chauhan from the local Hospital for Mental Health, Ahmedabad.



The group therapy in the form of awareness-raising workshops has been very beneficial in providing openness and acceptance of personal issues and dealing with them more effectively. Over the year, three such workshops were conducted covering a total of 76 women.

On the whole, through awareness women have gained an understanding of living a better quality of life by strongly facing the hurdles that come by. Counselling has provided better coping skills and a supportive environment where they feel empowered.

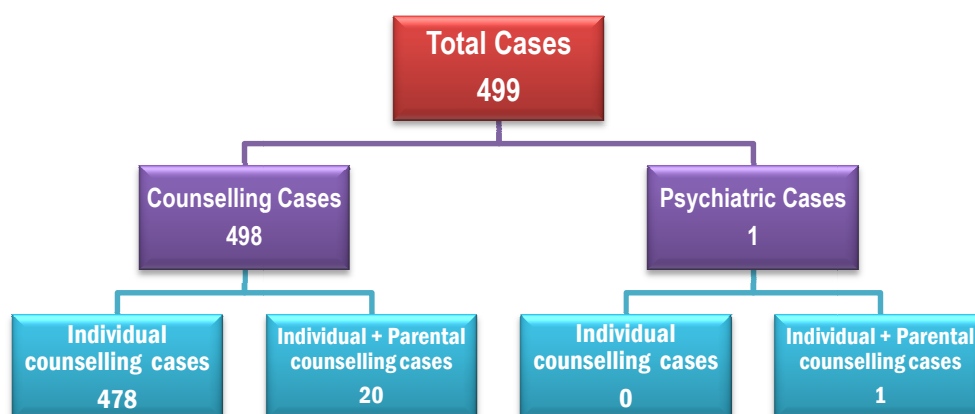


MENTAL HEALTHCARE OF ADOLESCENTS

The Mental Health Project for Adolescents, undertaken by AWAG is functional since September 2008. With common adolescent issues identified as adjustment problems, relationship issues, negative attitude towards marriage, educational issues, low self-esteem, family issues etc., the project makes an attempt to reach out to the adolescent group both in community as well as in schools and undertakes the following activities:

- Approaching schools to contact adolescents enrolled
- Approaching communities to contact non-school going and dropped out adolescents
- Guiding adolescents to curative path
- Counselling
- Psycho-education of parents
- Psychiatric care with medicines
- Teachers training for care of adolescents and monitoring of Teachers' performance

The project intervention had a two-pronged approach to reach out to the adolescents so as to provide them with a better understanding of mental health leading them towards cure through counselling and medical help as per need. Due attention was paid to providing more strength and support to the adolescents by working with both parents and teachers by making them more aware of their problems and developing a better understanding of the same. To start with, awareness raising meetings were organized with the help of community leaders and school authorities whereby AWAG conducted a total of 159 meetings covering 4537 adolescents. A total of 499 cases were handled over the year. Of these, 21 cases approached the Centre whereas 478 cases were handled in the school by the counsellor.



Summary of Cases

DIAGNOSIS OF ISSUES UNDER EACH CATEGORY

- Academic issues - 460 cases
- Emotional / behavioural / personal issues - 28 cases
- Family issues – 10 cases
- Psychiatric problems - 1 case diagnosed as ?Sibling Rivalry ?ODD ?Impulse Control.



Counselling of Adolescents at the School Level

Additionally, a total of 35 teachers from Raghunath Hindi Higher Secondary Vidyalaya underwent training workshops conducted by psychologists and psychotherapists. The objectives of the workshop were as follows:

- a) To create awareness about mental health
- b) To sensitize teachers to the psychological needs of the adolescent students so as to support them.
- c) To provide primary psychological and emotional help in academics, family issues etc.

Regular monitoring and follow-up of teachers was also conducted by AWAG. Likewise, in counselling cases, parents were provided with suitable suggestions to improve the mental health of their children.

The resultant effect of AWAG's interventions with adolescents over the year is that the affected children, their parents and teachers have gained considerable awareness regarding the psychological problems prevailing among adolescents. Moreover, through training workshops and counselling sessions, they have developed skills to cope effectively with their lives wherein the children experience a warm, secure and a healthy environment.

AWARENESS ON PREVENTING CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE

During AWAG's periodic interactions with the participating communities, women voiced their concerns with regard to safety & security of their children while they were out at work. The women further added that they often have to choose between safety of their children and earning their wages. Parents of sexually abused children are scared to tell anyone due to fear of being shamed in society. The trauma of sexual abuse in children often impacts the children through life; they become guilty, fearful, lonely & worried.

Since it is not possible to keep an eye on the children all the time, creating awareness on the issue was sought as a viable option. Thus, based on the above concerns voiced by the community women, AWAG embarked upon the issue of preventing child sexual abuse by undertaking awareness meetings with youth and school children in its rural and urban work areas in Radhanpur, Patan district and in Ahmedabad respectively.

These meetings were conducted through the story of *Komal* developed by CHILDLINE and focused on explaining about safe touch/unsafe touch/grooming along with other safety measures that parents and children must adopt in order to prevent abuse.

Over the year, a total of 39 meetings were conducted covering 2580 school children and youth, the details of which are tabulated below:

SHEudyami – INSPIRING WOMEN ENTREPRENEURS IN BIHAR, MADHYA PRADESH AND GUJARAT

SHEudyami is a concept towards creating women entrepreneurs from semi urban and rural parts of India. Entrepreneurial atmosphere in India is conducive enough for pursuing alternative business ideas. The project was supported by Fullerton India Credit Company Limited (FICCL) and was implemented by AWAG along with its technical partner SCORE Livelihood Foundation (SCORE). The project was implemented in the states of Bihar, Madhya Pradesh & Gujarat covering a total of eight locations viz- Bapunagar, Gomtipur & Kheda in Gujarat, Koilakh village & Rampatti (Madhubani), & Muzaffarpur in Bihar and Dhar & Dwarkapuri, Indore in Madhya Pradesh. The location of the project was decided in consultation with the Fullerton officials of Gram Shakti Branch at the district level where they have a customer base. A total of 350 women were imparted training on the need-based skills pertaining to Madhubani painting and Tailoring and stitching. Out of 350, 148 women started working either full time or part time from their home. Most of the women are working on a part-time basis as they are housewives and have their domestic responsibilities to fulfil.

The objective of the project was to help women in the following areas so as to make them self-reliant:

- Build their entrepreneurial capacity
- Provide them the required need based vocational/technical know-how
- Link them with the financial resources; and
- Assist them in market linkages

The project was implemented in three phases:

Pre training: The phase entailed community mobilization, field visit, training need analysis, training centre identification and finalization.

Training: In this phase there were two different types of training followed by an awareness camp and field visits which catered to the diverse aspects of the entrepreneurial journey of women trainees. These trainings helped them to enhance their trade specific skills & develop an understanding of business and enhance their personality.

Post training: Certification was organized for the women who successfully completed the course and had performed well in their assessments. 336 out of 353 women had been certified across the all eight centers. The focus of the project was to connect the women with the local vendors for facilitation of market linkages.

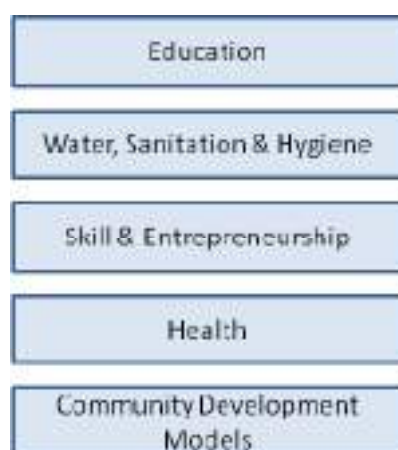
Above all, the SHEudyami project garnered self-confidence, increased their skill levels and gave women their due recognition in their society. Today the trained women have a sense of pride and enhanced self-esteem.

SARALsamuday - Sustainable Action for Resilience & Advanced Livelihood

SARALsamuday is a village development program implemented in collaboration by AWAG and L&T Hydrocarbon Engineering, along with our technical partner SCORE Livelihood Foundation. Building on the experiences of a pilot project that was undertaken last year in villages Ropa and Mastupura villages of Waghodiya taluka in Vadodara district of Gujarat, the current year covered another three villages viz Bakrol, Sikandarpura and Hanumanpura in Waghodiya taluka. In order to understand the detailed community needs of these villages, a detailed Community Needs Assessment was conducted covering all 535 households.

The project goal was to initiate a Sustainable Action for Resilience and Advanced Livelihood by focusing on the skill building, entrepreneurship and health of the community. Thus the program objectives were to:

- build the employability and entrepreneurship skills of the youths including women to augment livelihood options for youth and women
- engaging and strengthening community institutions through various linkages
- creating enabling environment in schools and community for education, awareness and capacity building
- build capacities of community about the various aspects of health through health check-up, information and access the health services

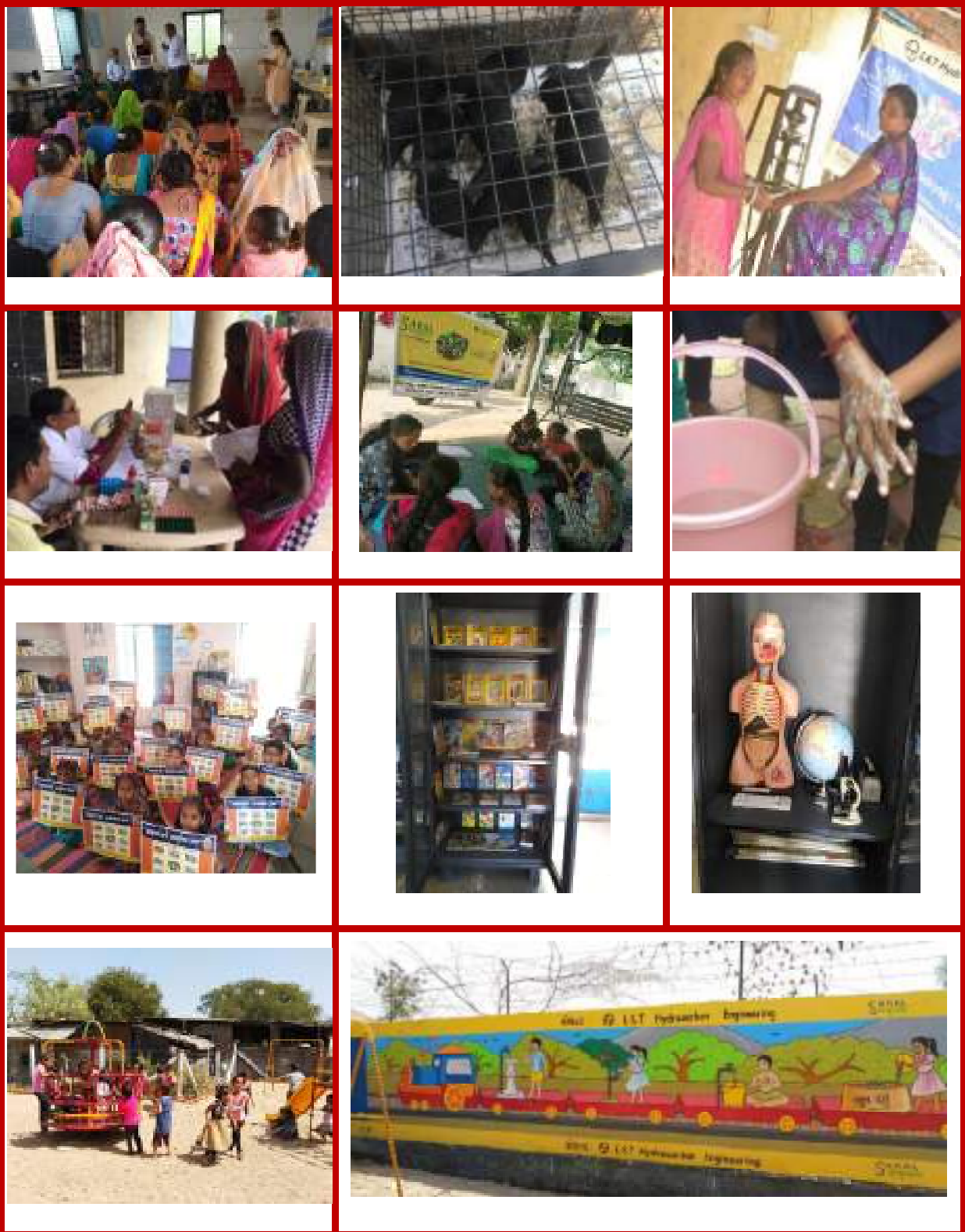


Having said that, the project rolled out the planned activities in two phases wherein the Phase 1 activities pertained to interventions to follow-up and strengthening of the efforts put in during the pilot project; while Phase 2 pertained to activities undertaken in the new targeted villages. A diagrammatic representation of the project inputs and impact are given below for a quick understanding.

MULTI PURPOSE WOMEN WELFARE CENTRES (MPWWC)

AWAG runs a Multipurpose Women Welfare Centre at Radhanpur, Dist Patan, Gujarat. The Centre supported by Department of Women and Child Development, Government of Gujarat provides:

- Counselling
- Police Assistance
- Filing of DIR
- Legal Support
- Information and support in accessing the ongoing government schemes

A total of 854 women derived benefit of the said project over the year.

Leaflets were distributed on following topics:

- Legislations on Domestic Violence against Women (Domestic Violence Act-2005)
- Stop Discrimination against Girls and 'Beti-Bachao'
- Prevention of Child Marriage
- Registration of birth, death and marriage
- Ongoing Government schemes and its benefits



AWAG'S CONTINUING ACTIVITIES

➤ **Counselling Centres**

The counselling service provided by AWAG is available at its centres in the rural and urban work areas. Each year, an average of 400 women derive benefit from these services.

➤ **Legal Aid Centres**

Similarly, AWAG runs Legal Aid Centres where women seeking legal assistance are provided counselling and aid. They are also offered support in attending court proceedings.

➤ **Income Generation**

The victims of domestic violence are offered skill training to meet their economic needs. They acquire skills and upgrade their learning to a high level and then start working to generate an income. Most women get absorbed into tailoring/stitching at the organization's Production Centre at Bapunagar. The rest undertake other activities. Linkages have been established with Fabindia for garment making.

During the year women were provided skill development training.

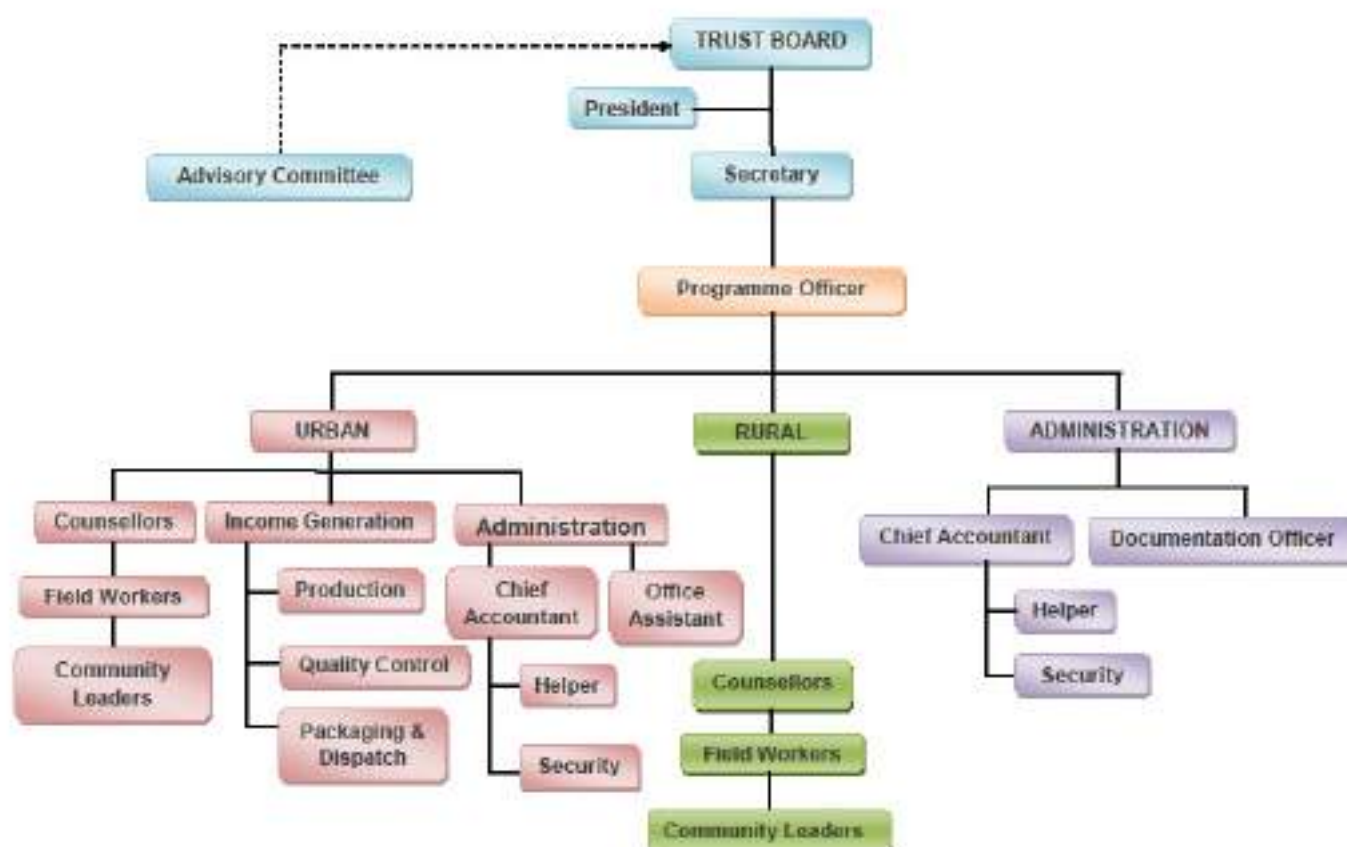

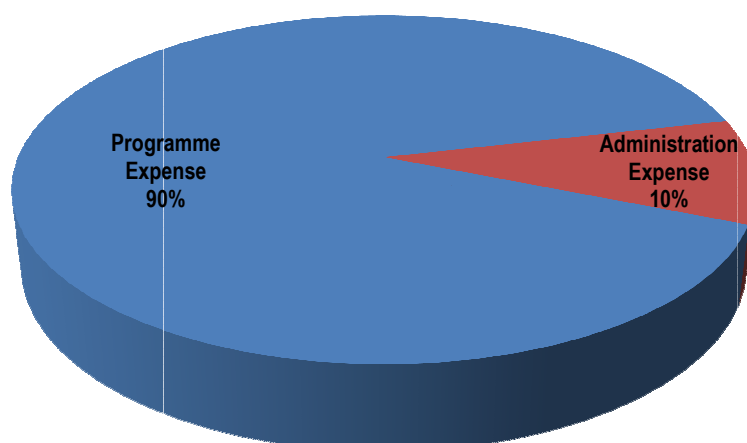
